The study aims to tackle the disadvantages experienced by neurodivergent children in rural communities, by improving access to effective mental health services using the evidence-based Secret Agent Society (SAS) Small Group program. SAS helps children build important social and emotional tools through gamified learning and clinician-led sessions.

By working closely with children, parents, educators, and clinicians, the project will co-design solutions that make these digital services easier to use

The project takes a comprehensive, community-focused approach to explore strategies for reducing falls by integrating hospital-based education, digital health tools and community support and aims to create a scalable fall prevention model that can be rolled out nationwide.

The team will assess the feasibility, acceptability and scalability of these strategies, aiming to reduce the burden on healthcare systems while helping older adults stay healthier at home and fostering stronger community support

Collaborative Research Request - Applications Still Open

A reminder that RHRF's Collaborative Research Request is still open and taking applications up until 7th August 2025.

A total funding of \$1.2 million is available in this round of Collaborative Research Request (CRR) grant. RHRF will provide up to \$400,000 in cash contribution per project, for projects of duration up to five years, on the condition that RHRF is **not the only** participant to provide cash support.

RHRF will consider requests to financially support and be involved in collaborative research projects. These may include applications for:

- National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) grants
- Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF) grants
- Australian Research Council (ARC) grants
- Cooperative Research Centres (CRC) grants
- Or other similar Australian based grant schemes

Lisa Horvath, Chief Clinical Officer and Director of Research at Chris O'Brien Lifehouse and Ramsay Hospital Research Foundation grant recipient, explains how the world-first blood test, PCPro, is chaning how we understand and treat advanced prostate cancer.

Developed using comprehensive lipid profiling, PCPro can identify the 12% of patients with metastatic castration-resistant prostate cancer (mCRPC) who have a significantly poorer prognosis, with a median survival of just 12–13 months.

Ramsay Hospital Research Foudnation proudly funded the early stages of this project. It's great to see the team leverage this and securing additional funding to progress the research


