Project Title:


Triggered Acute Risk Prevention (TARP): A Novel Model of Care to Improve Cardiovascular and Mental Health Outcomes.

Project Aim:

Triggers such as acute emotional stress have been identified in up to half of heart attacks and stroke, yet until now, have not been used for preventive strategies. This project aims to evaluate a novel care model, TARP, which helps individuals with cardiovascular disease identify acute emotional stress through educational resources and respond appropriately with medication (propranolol and aspirin).

Project Title:

Early Pain Intervention after total Knee replacement (EPIK): a registry-nested trial

Project aim:

About 1 in 4 Australians develop persistent pain after TKR and currently, there is no established model of care to effectively manage these patients. The EPIK Trial, which is based on an overseas model of care, will address how a coordinated, multidisciplinary model-of-care can improve outcomes and reduce costs for people with persistent pain post Total Knee Replacement (TKR), ensuring they get the right care at the right time.

Project Title:

Reducing Opioids After fracture Discharge (ROAD): Randomised Controlled Trial (RCT)

Project aim:

Up to 70% of Australian hospitals send patients home with opioids 'just-in-case'. This over-prescription is associated with avoidable chronic opioid use, addiction, overdose and death. This trial will identify which patients can be managed without opioids at discharge and demonstrate the real-world effectiveness, safety and

acceptability of opioid-free prescribing in these patients.
