

Commonwealth Games fever is building at Donvale Rehabilitation Hospital. One of Donvale's physiotherapists, Libby Allen, has been selected to represent Australia in the 800m track event.

Libby, 25 years of age, qualified for the event at the National Championships held in Sydney in February 2006, running her season's best time of 2.02 minutes.

Australia's track and field team consists of 107 athletes.

To enable her rigorous training of two sessions per day, Libby has reduced her full time workload, currently working reduced hours five days per week. In an average week she runs 80km.

Libby took up athletics at high school and runs for local club, Doncaster. Libby placed 2nd in the 800m at the National Championships in 2005 and 2004. Her goal at the Games is to run a PB (personal best) and, importantly, to have fun in an event that will be a career highlight.

Hospital staff are also getting into the festivities and will be holding activities for patients and staff throughout the Games' period. Patients are gearing up for the event by helping to make paper chains (in the colours of the Games) to decorate the hospital. During the Games patients will be encouraged to see if they too can achieve (walking) distances of 400, 800 and 1500m during the course of their rehabilitation.

Staff are planning to award gold medals to patients who achieve their goals in rehab. Race debriefing and critiquing will be conducted in Occupational Therapy during the daily living skills group, and the speech therapists have created quizzes and word games for patients (and staff!) to ponder.

Radical new heart surgery televised from Lake Macquarie

Cutting edge heart surgery was performed at Lake Macquarie Private Hospital in December and televised to about 400 cardiologists from around the world as part of the inaugural Asia Pacific Interventional Advances (APIA) Conference held in Newcastle.

The new keyhole procedure, performed for the first time in Australia, uses a device that may lessen the risk of stroke for patients with a particular hole in the heart condition.

The "live "case procedure was performed by Monash Medical Centre Director of Cardiology Professor Richard Harper.


Previously open heart surgery was required for the repair of a small valve-flap hole in the heart. This new

procedure allows for the insertion of the device through a catheter to close the hole, therefore reducing the chances of the patients suffering from a stroke.

The APIA Conference Course Director, Interventional cardiologist Dr Suku Thambar, said that trials may show migraine sufferers also benefit by the percutaneous closure.

Dr Thambar said the procedure was groundbreaking and that Lake Macquarie Private Hospital was the natural forum for it.

'Lake Macquarie Private Hospital is a leading private hospital with more than 3500 interventional procedures performed every year," Dr Thambar said.

Tamworth to become a medical training centre



A new Rural Clinical School for undergraduate doctors from the University of Newcastle will open in Tamworth on 1 July 2006, aiming to stem the shortage of doctors in rural and regional Australia.

The University of Newcastle will receive \$1.5 million a year for the next three years to operate the Tamworth Rural Clinical School which will allow medical students from the university to receive clinical training in hospitals and general practices in Tamworth, with training options also available in Armidale, Moree and Taree.

Ramsay Health Care owns Tamara Private Hospital, a medical/ surgical hospital established 20 years ago and located in Tamworth. Tamara Private CEO Annette Arthur said the hospital was very pleased that this has been announced.

"We have been working for sometime to stem the tide of doctors moving from Tamworth, and I think this initiative will go a long way to assisting with the problems we have of attracting doctors to rural and regional Australia," Annette said.

Together with the creation of University Departments of Rural Health, the rural clinical schools are a key part of the government's rural health strategy.

Mr Abbott said that as a result of the 10 rural clinical schools that have been opened across Australia since 2002, a quarter of the nation's medical students are now spending at least a year of their clinical training in rural and remote areas.

Government looks to Greenslopes for future medical school

Greenslopes Private Hospital has been singled out by the Federal Government to become a teaching hospital for up to 60 fee-paying medical students.

CEO of Greenslopes, Associate Professor Jill Watts, said Greenslopes welcomed the Commonwealth funding to support additional places for medical students in Queensland and looked forward to being involved with teaching in the future. The Council of Australian Governments (COAG) has agreed to increase the number of training places for doctors. Universities will now be able to offer significantly more places for fee paying students. Up to 25 per cent of their students can now be fee paying. This means an extra 285 students can start training as doctors across Australia next year.

Business Development **Update**

The last few months have been busy in the Business Development Unit of Ramsay Health Care as the Company moves to divest the former Affinity hospitals as ruled by the Australian Competition & Consumer Commission.

The sale of Nepean and The Mount private hospitals to Healthscope completed in January which leaves a balance of 3 hospitals from the 14 hospitals still to be transferred to Healthscope. The Hills, Prince of Wales and Melbourne Private are still undergoing government approvals before transfer can take place. We expect that these hospitals will transfer in the next few months.

> The sale of the other five divestment hospitals - Lingard, Belmont, North Gosford, The Valley and South Eastern was successfully negotiated with BCN Pty Ltd. The Directors of BCN were involved with Nova Health Care. The transfer of these hospitals will take place once the Departments of Health agree to the licence transfers and Australian Unity consents to the assignment of The Valley lease which we expect will occur in March. BCN have advised that the hospitals will trade as "Healthe Care Australia" ("HCA").


We are currently negotiating a Transitional Services Agreement with HCA which will include Payroll, Accounts Payable and related IT services.

Following a strategic review of all our assets we are continuing to evaluate the divestment of our aged care business and focus on private hospitals. As part of this process we completed the sale of our community care business, Silver Circle, to the Little Company of Mary in February. The Little Company of Mary took over this business effective from 14 February 2006. No decision has yet been reached on the aged care business.

Business Development activities will focus on capital investment opportunities within the Group over the next 12 – 24 months. We are currently reviewing all proposed major capital expenditure projects. As part of this process, additional land has been purchased adjacent to St George, Warringal and Linacre.

Peninsula Private Hospital held a rally in Frankston on Friday the 17th of February to urge Roche Products Pty Limited and the Federal Government and to do what it takes to get Herceptin for early stage breast cancer onto the PBS.

Hundreds of supporters showed up to the rally, many of whom are patients directly affected by the current ruling regarding Herceptin for early stage breast cancer.

The following speakers addressed HER-2 positive breast cancer, the Therapeutic Goods Administration and PBS approval process, and the personal impact of the current Herceptin ruling:

Petitions for Federal Health Minister Tony Abbott were circulated and information distributed about organizations, such as Thomaiy Breast Cancer Research Fund, that are raising money to buy the drugs for those in need.

The objective of this event was to put pressure on the government and Roche through public awareness, and to reinforce the community and individual efforts already being undertaken to alleviate the suffering of so many young women with early stage breast cancer.

Hollywood Best in the West

Hollywood Private Hospital recently commissioned a community consultation survey to audit its target market's perceptions and compare them with perceptions of competitors.

It was found that Hollywood has the most positive patient experience of the five most popular Perth hospitals.

Hollywood outperforms these hospitals on four areas of the patient experience, with significantly more of its patients rating their experience with specialists, nursing care, reputation and the overall experience very favourable. The survey was conducted by mail amongst 10,000 western suburbs residents and achieved a reasonable response rate.

Overall, the image of Hollywood is an extremely positive one. Almost nine in 10 who responded have a favourable impression of Hollywood, with half the respondents having a very favourable impression.

These impressions are strongly influenced by experiences, either first-hand as a patient or visitor, or second-hand via feedback from others who have been to Hollywood.

All except one of the people who responded had heard of Hollywood Private Hospital before receiving the survey and 98.4 per cent know where the hospital is located.

70.4 per cent of respondents would choose to be admitted to Hollywood as a patient. The main reasons for choosing Hollywood include convenient location, reputation as a good hospital, personal experience and good service and care.

All previous patients of Hollywood who completed the survey said they would go back to there for treatment. The main reasons given were high standard of care and satisfaction with the care they received.



New Dental Hospital for Joondalup Health Campus

The Western Australian Health Minister, Jim McGinty, Tony O'Gorman MLA and Dianne Guise MLA visited the site of a new \$2.2 million dental clinic to be built at Joondalup Health Campus. The dental clinic will significantly reduce waiting times for Northern suburbs residents and it is expected to open in September 2006. Work has begun on the new state-of-the-art dental clinic which will treat approx 10,000 health care and pensioner concession card-holders per year.

The Avenue Hospital acquires new Stryker high-tech Video & Conferencing Facilities



The Avenue Hospital, Melbourne, has recently installed state-of-the-art Stryker Video equipment which allows live images from theatre to be beamed directly into the conference room, allowing direct interaction between the Surgeon and their audience. In turn, live Surgery can be beamed externally to another site within Australia or the world.

This provides a unique opportunity for Surgery education sessions at The Avenue for other Surgeons, registrars and nursing staff, as well as education for local GPs and members of the public.

This facility is valuable for new and innovative procedures from all types of MIS Surgery. The Stryker high definition cameras, set-up in Theatre Four, provide the best resolution possible for minimally invasive surgeries, such as arthroscopy, laparoscopy, and cystoscopy. Procedures can now also be captured digitally onto CD, DVD, and Memory stick as well as allowing the availability of color copies at the end of the case.

This new Video and Conferencing facility, together with the Stryker Cameras, puts The Avenue Hospital at the forefront of Video Communication used for Teaching and Education within the Australian Hospital Community. This investment also makes it one of just a small number of Hospitals in Australia with such a facility.

Recently Professor Paul O'Brien preformed a live laparoscopic adjustable gastric banding procedure to a surgical audience in Leeds, UK. The new facilities allowed the surgeons abroad to watch, ask questions and listen to live commentary during the operation. Professor O'Brien subsequently presented an illustrated lecture live to the same audience from the conference centre, again allowing discussion between the two sites. The training session not only received extremely positive feedback from the UK team, but the equipment also allowed Professor O'Brien's to remain in Melbourne versus having to travel abroad.

Training sessions will be conducted in early 2006 to ensure maximum use and exposure of the equipment by all staff.

New Choices at Caboolture

Caboolture Private Hospital will become the first hospital outside of the Wesley Private Hospital in the northern suburbs of Brisbane to offer an extension of the well-recognised Kim Walters Choices STRETCH-Exercise Program for breast cancer sufferers.

STRETCH is designed to meet the specific needs of women following breast cancer diagnosis utilising exercises to improve range, motion, flexibility and strength particularly in the upper body.

The program is specifically designed for post surgery patients prior to them embarking on their radiotherapy or chemotherapy regime.

The six week program to be offered at Caboolture Private Hospital will start on 30 March in facilities that have been refurbished for this specific purpose.

Caboolture Private Clinical Oncology Nurse Vicky Tanzer said she was extremely excited about the prospect of offering this program from the Caboolture Private Hospital.

"We will be able to meet the needs of those ladies from the Caboolture and North Coast regions, who would otherwise find it difficult to access the Wesley which is located in the western suburbs of Brisbane.

"Caboolture is a pleasant 20-30 minute drive from the northern suburbs of Brisbane and from the Sunshine Coast. The hospital is also easily accessible with free and plentiful parking."

She said the cost free program was a stretch exercise program specifically designed to provide holistic support to ladies with newly diagnosed breast cancer.

"There will also be opportunities for discussion amongst program participants of the many aspects of maintaining good health and meeting other women who have had a similar experience," Vicky said.

n October 2005, Berkeley Vale Private Hospital officially opened a dedicated Day Surgery Unit. The Unit consists of a 1st stage operating suite with 10 trolleys; a 2nd stage recovery with 10 trolleys and a 3rd stage recovery with 7 recliners.

The list of approved procedures that will be undertaken in the Day Surgery Unit includes: gastroenterological, ophthalmic, dental, minor orthopaedic, minor plastics, ENT, minor urological, gynaecological, general surgical, vascular and oral & maxillofacial procedures.

The opening of the Day Surgery Unit allows the hospital to increase its inpatient capacity therefore reducing waiting times for admission.

Mitcham kitchen Shop of Year

The Cairns Private Hospital's contribution to training Queensland Ambulance paramedics in coronary management has been recognised in an Achievement Certificate presented at the Australia Day Awards ceremony in January 2006.

The award recognised the Cardiac Services team at Cairns Private for their ongoing support of paramedic staff via cardiac investigation laboratory clinical placement.

The Cardiac Services team has been providing clinical placement training to second and third year paramedics for the past four years.

Cairns Private Hospital CEO Richard Lizzio said the Cardiac Services team provides superior cardiac care and its professionalism sets an excellent example for junior staff to watch and learn from.

"It is great that the work and efforts of this dedicated group of individuals has been recognised," he said.

Last year the team was ranked in the top 25 per cent of the country on a national patient satisfaction survey conducted by Press Ganey.

Queensland Ambulance Regional Staff Development Manager Sally White said the Cairns Private cardiac team has shown enormous generosity by taking the time to educate paramedics about the delicate nature of cardiac angiography and post procedural care.

The students observe a coronary angiography being undertaken, which is a diagnostic investigation of the heart where a catheter is inserted into an artery in the

groin or arm and guided into the interior of the heart.

Ms White said the experience brings the paramedics' physiology and anatomy knowledge to life, making it relative to the management of their patients during a hospital transfer.

The students have the invaluable opportunity to talk first hand with cardiologists and nurses about the procedure.

"The ambulance staff rave about the CPH training and the staff, especially Clinical Nurse Manager Sheena Cunningham, and this award is our way of saying thanks," she said.

Since opening the 1999 the Cardiac Catheter Laboratory at Cairns Private has performed over 5000 coronary angiograms and implanted more than 250 permanent pacemakers including "state-of-the-art" implantable cardiac defibrillators and Bi-ventricular pacemakers.

Record First Half for Cairns Private Hospital

Despite the constant challenge of the national nurse and doctor shortage the Cairns Private Hospital has recorded its highest number of operations over a six month period.

More than 5000 surgical procedures were carried out in the six months to December 2005, amounting to an increase

the six months to December 2005, amounting to an increase of 17 per cent. That is equivalent to an extra month on the theatre schedule. This followed an increase of 10 per cent the previous year.

The maternity ward has also been bulging with a growth in births of almost 35 per cent, equivalent to two months of extra activity.

The increase in surgical activity has been attributed to several factors, one being a change in wards. A specialised surgical ward, an orthopaedic ward, and a new orthopaedic rehabilitation unit have been established which are better meeting the needs of the patients and surgeons who are utilising the hospital more.

But CEO Richard Lizzio said it was the staff who were the linchpin to a smooth running hospital, and despite the critical nationwide shortage of medical professionals the Hospital had been able to meet the demands of this record activity.

Cairns Private has also been successful in attracting a number of new specialists to the region which has increased supply of medical services to the community.

Ball raises \$30,000 for Joondalup Paediatric Ward

A Charity Ball conducted by the Rotary Club in late 2005 raised nearly \$30,000 for the Paediatric ward of the Joondalup Health Campus.

The Hospital was presented with the funds raised by the Rotary Club in January 2006 and will use the funds to purchase two pulse oximeters which measure oxygen levels in the blood as well as other equipment for the Paediatric Ward.

Hospital CEO, Kempton Cowan said that both sponsors of the Ball and the guests who attended were exceedingly generous.

"This event was a community event, in every sense of the word. Our sponsors came from the local community, as did our guests, with special thanks to the City of Joondalup, Edith Cowan University and Joondalup Resort," he said.

Integration Update

Year 2006 continues the integration process of the New Ramsay hospitals into the Ramsay fold. There is a substantial amount of work-in-progress at the moment including:

- Devolvement of accounting and accounts payable functions from the Melbourne-office back into the hospitals;
- Transfer of corporate accounting functions from Melbourne Office to Ramsay Head Office to Sydney;
- Review of the major financial accounting software packages;
- Conversion of all new hospitals and Melbourne Office from the Affinity IT network to the standard operating environment of the Ramsay IT network;
- Divestment of 14 ex-Affinity hospitals to Healthscope (only three remain to be transferred);
- Divestment of three ex-Affinity and two old Ramsay hospitals to Healthe Care Australia;
- Provision of Transitional Services to both Healthscope and Healthe Care Australia;
- Rollout of the national safety management process (OH&S and Workers Compensation) to all hospitals;
- Rollout of Ramsay Health Care core uniform range;
- Review of library services across the Group;
- Rebranding of hospitals with new signage and new stationery. Signage process largely complete by end February 2006.

The project to integrate the New Ramsay hospitals into the Ramsay IT infrastructure has now begun. The project will be considered successful when:

All ex-Affinity facilities and the Melbourne office have been migrated to the Ramsay IT network;

- All personal computers, laptops and servers have been re-imaged to the Ramsay Standard Operating Environment ("SOE");
- Ramsay has exited the HP service and leasing contract;
- training has been provided to all authorised users of the IT systems, together with guidance on policies and procedures to be followed within the network. The "authorised users" include staff from all departments of the hospitals.
