World leading breast cancer specialist unveils revolutionary trial at North West Private

world leading specialist in the detection A of breast cancer unveiled an Australia-first trial of a revolutionary breast cancer test in Brisbane at North West Private Hospital in July.

The test could enable doctors to determine instantly whether a woman has cancer or not without doing a biopsy.

Dr Richard Barr, Professor of Radiology at Northeastern Ohio University's College of Medicine, visited the Queensland Diagnostic Imaging (QDI) facility at North West Private Hospital - the first site in Australia to trial the Siemens Medical breast cancer detection technology.

Called Elasticity Imaging, Siemens Medical is set to introduce the technology into Australia, which could lead to more accurate cancer tests and potentially save thousands of Queensland women from the cost, discomfort and anxiety of a biopsy.

Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in women in Australia. It is also the leading cause of cancer related death among Australian women. Early detection through screening is the best way to combat cancer at its early, most treatable stages.

The North West Breast Clinic at North West Private Hospital is supported by leading

surgeons and medical oncologists. North West Private Hospital has an oncology day treatment centre which provides treatment, care and support for people living with cancer.

eLearning update

An elearning Pilot Project, which is designed to test if we can use elearning as a training tool across Ramsay Health Care, is on track to commence with about 60 users from Greenslopes, Hollywood and St George in September.

Once we have run the Pilot for 2 – 3 months we will review how effective it has been and then look at adding more training modules in other areas.

New Cardiac Services opened at Linacre Private

edicated new cardiac services teamed with some of Melbourne's leading cardiac physicians are now available to Melbourne's Bayside community and were formally opened this month by the Bayside Mayor, His Worship Councillor John Knight and Ramsay Health Care.

Linacre Private Hospital has joined forces with Melbourne Heart Care (formerly Bayside HeartCare) to open a state-of-the-art, purpose-built cardiac facility which incorporates an acute coronary care unit, a purpose-built cardiac catheter laboratory and comprehensive inpatient and outpatient cardiology services

A dedicated onsite cardiac consulting suite, including outpatient treatment rooms, has also been built and is collocated with the cardiac services at Linacre Private Hospital.

The facilities were formally opened in the presence of Ramsay Health Care Managing Director Pat Grier, local specialists, general practitioners and the Melbourne Heart Care team

Linacre Private Hospital Chief Executive Officer Tracey Tobias said the opening of the cardiology unit at Linacre would fill a need for cardiac services within the Melbourne Bayside community.

"The new cardiac services at Linacre Private will be a major boost for this area. Until now, patients have been forced to travel to Frankston, Prahran or Clayton for cardiac care," Ms Tobias said.

"When we

looked at the demographics of the Bayside region, a quarter of the population is over 65 years and yet we did not offer a specialist service in cardiac disease, which is the most common health care problem in older people."

"The role of the smaller community hospital in providing vital services, is expanding," Ms Tobias said.

Nambour Selangor celebrates 60 years with the opening of a new Wing

crowd of 350 well wishers gathered at Nambour Selangor Private Hospital in late July to help the hospital celebrate its 60th birthday and witness the official opening of the new 27-bed Miles Savill Wing.

Nambour Selangor Private Hospital was founded by two ex-Australian Army Nurses, Sisters Dorothy Ralston and Christine Oxley, in July 1947. And while both women have now passed away, four members of Sister Ralston's family attended the celebrations - helping to cut the hospital's birthday cake.

Also in attendance was Mrs Joan St Clair- the first baby born in the original Selangor Private Hospital. Joan travelled from Goondiwindi for the celebrations bringing with her the silver commemorative cup presented to her mother 60 years ago.

"Our new wing is named after prominent local medical practitioner, Dr Miles Savill, who was Selangor's Medical Director between 1960 and 1986," said CEO Ms Jenny McDonald.

"It is a \$4.5 million investment by Ramsay Health Care and gives us the capability to expand our medical, surgical and obstetric services - in particular respiratory, orthopaedic and general surgery.

"This new development increases our capacity to 100 beds, and gives us an opportunity to offer our patients ready access to enhanced rehabilitation and palliative care services. As part of the redevelopment, we have also added an extra 60 car parking spaces."

Ramsay Health Care's Managing Director, Mr Pat Grier, travelled to the Sunshine Coast to help Dr Savill officially open the Miles Savill Wing.

The Miles Savill Wing is a purpose-built health care facility combining hotelstyle luxury with expert medical and nursing care. Decorated in soft pastels and earthy tones, most rooms have a tranquil bush outlook. Each room has a modern ensuite appointed with quality cabinetry and fixtures.

The Miles Savill Wing also houses a new custom-designed rehabilitation room, equipped for the assessment and rehabilitation of patients prior to their

New theatres announced for Baringa Private

🔁 amsay Health Care has announced a new 4 theatre complex to be built at Baringa Private Hospital in Coffs Harbour.

The new theatres with provide much needed additional capacity to facilitate the growing number of specialists recruited to the area including urologists, orthopaedics, endocrine, gynaecologists, ENT surgeons and neurosurgeons undertaking laminectomies. The theatres will also provide the opportunity for surgeons not currently operating in Coffs Harbour to be recruited, particularly vascular, in addition to urologists and orthopaedic surgeons.

The development will be staged to enable the existing theatres to continue to function without interruption, a challenging project given that the new theatres will essentially be built on the site of the current theatres. Initially, three new theatres will be constructed incorporating the shell of a fourth which will be commissioned at a later date. Consulting suites currently occupied by specialists will be required to accommodate a much larger CSSD posing another relocation challenge.

The new theatre complex at Baringa will be supplemented by an existing endoscopy suite which will also be subject to further future re-development and by the ophthalmology and plastic surgery theatre in the Coffs Harbour Day Surgical Centre, a stand alone day surgery located in the centre of Coffs Harbour.

Together with Ramsay Professional Services, an allied health based business unit, these facilities constitute Ramsay Health Care – Coffs Harbour and will be well poised to cope with the needs of a growing north coast community.

APPG is a true alternative to MIMS online as both source the same material. The link to APPG is on the Library Intranet site at: http://ramsay/corporate/library/ default.asp

The most valuable feature of this product is that there is unlimited access from within all hospitals.

Dynamed is a clinical reference tool, created primarily for use at the 'point-ofcare', with summaries for nearly 2,000 topics. It is updated daily and monitors the content of over 500 medical journals and systematic evidence review databases. The new evidence is integrated with existing content and the overall conclusions represent a synthesis of the best available evidence. There is unlimited access to Dynamed from a link on the Library site, and also PDA download access on application.

99 offers made in overseas recruitment drive

Group HR has recently returned from a successful overseas recruitment drive in the UK where almost 150 nurses were interviewed for roles in Ramsay hospitals in Australia with a total of 99 offers made.

Of these offers, 20 of the candidates are expected to commence before the end of the year. Group HR Manager Gavin O'Meara said many Ramsay hospitals already had a good number of overseas nurses on staff and had found real benefits to employing people from different countries and backgrounds.

"We are experiencing a rather unique situation in Australia, and indeed around the world, where our labour market is very constrained with significant skills shortages across all sectors, particularly health care," Gavin said.

"We already have a large number of overseas employees working in Ramsay hospitals and a recent survey revealed that there are in fact, in excess of 440 overseas clinicians employed across the group.

"We have had great success with overseas employees who arrive here on temporary visas. After a period of time, many of these employees decide to convert to permanent residency and become long-term valued members of staff."

Gavin said we had a role to play in welcoming overseas employees into Ramsay Health Care and as a colleague, supervisor, Director of Nursing or new graduate, all staff could help these important and valuable employees settle into their new life in Australia by providing guidance, friendship, support, understanding and acceptance.

"Some overseas employees may take longer to settle in or may require some additional support.

Group HR is currently developing an online orientation program for new overseas employees to undertake prior to arriving into the country so that they can gain some vital information prior to arriving – about what to expect and what it is like to work in an Australian private hospital, particularly one owned by Ramsay Health Care. If you can think of ways to assist in the early orientation of our overseas employees, Group HR would love to hear from you.

Group HR is also particularly keen to hear from some of existing overseas employees about their experience (good or bad) and some suggestions for how we could orient better for relocation.

Shane has over 26 years experience in the industry and since rejoining JHC in 2003, has implemented a number of initiatives including a 'Fast Track' system which contributed to a reduction in the number of Emergency Department patients having to wait for admission from 10% to 4%. Furthermore JHC is the first hospital in WA to introduce to nurse practitioner role for the ED which was implemented by Shane earlier this year.

Healthy outlook for Mitcham Private



here is good news for Whitehorse residents with Mitcham Private Hospital being recognised nationally for its innovation and commitment to clinical quality and patient safety.

Mitcham Private has received a \$30,000 grant from the Medibank Private Safety and Clinical Improvement Incentive Pool to fund a project to understand why there is an increasing rate of Caesarean births amongst women using the hospital. Caesarean births carry increased risk for the mother and baby, require a longer stay in hospital and add recovery time.

At a presentation ceremony held at the hospital in August, Mitcham Private Chief Executive Officer Michael Rozek spoke about the hospital's commitment to continually improve the standards of patient safety and clinical quality.

"The hospital will review all births in 2007 at Mitcham and use an internationally recognised classification system to classify all obstetric cases. Data will be analysed to review the rate of Caesarean births within each classification, and this information will be compared between similar obstetric populations, enabling us to determine if there are any significant variations and possible reasons for them.

"Depending on the reasons identified, changes to clinical practice of that group may be made to improve both mother and baby's health outcomes.

"We thank Medibank Private for their support of our project and are pleased to work together to continually improve patient health outcomes," Mr Rozek.

More than one million dollars has been granted by Medibank Private to hospitals around Australia this year, with Victorian hospitals receiving a total of almost \$322,000 to fund quality and safety projects, almost a third of the total funding made available in the current program. In the last two years Medibank Private has provided \$1.9 million in funding for 74 quality and safety projects across 65 hospitals.

Medibank Private's Hospital Contract Manager Eric Wirth praised the local projects as being of a particularly high standard.

"Quality and safety is emerging as the number one issue in Australian health care, so it is inspiring that local private hospitals are now being recognised for their effort and innovation.

"Australia has some of the best quality hospital care in the world, but there is always room for improvement, and improvement and innovation should be supported. Medibank Private is proud to be working with hospitals to improve health outcomes, not just for our members, but for everyone.

"And its great to see some real innovation coming not just from the big, metropolitan hospitals, but also from suburban facilities such as Mitcham Private. It is this sort of commitment that is keeping Victorian private hospitals at the forefront of innovation and safety," Mr Wirth said.

The lessons learned from the various quality and safety projects funded over the last two years will be shared throughout the health sector, extending the value of individual projects far beyond the hospitals in which they are run.

Sydney & Central Coast Linen Service

Ramsay Health Care became a major partner in hte Sydney & Central Coast RLinen Service (SCCLS) in 2006. The Linen Service is located at Somersby on the New South Wales Central Coast (about 10 minutes out of Gosford) and currently services twelve (12) Ramsay Health Care hospitals and other private facilities between the Newcastle and Sutherland shire in Sydney.

SCCLS has been in operation since 2004 and at that time the service was processing 7 tonnes per week, compared to the 60 tonnes per week currently processing. An initial team of 10 employees has now grown to 110. The initial factory of 1463m2 has now expanded in size to 3408m2. These are just a few examples of the growth of the SCCLS in the past 3 years.

When the linen service first started, washer extractors and stand alone dryers were used to wash/dry the linen. In early 2006 the service purchased a Continuous Batch Washer (large washing machine with 16 loads, each load is 50kg) together with a group of gas dryers, 3 ironers, 2 folders, picker, and steam press.

The service has recently purchased another Continuous Batch Washer (this one holds 20 loads) with a group of steam dryers.

A new theatre pack area has now been built. This new area is larger than the current theatre pack and is a much better work environment for the staff.

The plant area itself consists of the dirty sorting area, wash area, three ironer lines with a 4th being installed, folding section (towel folders, blanket folder, and folding table), and Theatre Pack.

SCCLS owns the linen and facilities rent the linen from the service. The linen loss that happens is of huge concern eg linen being thrown in rubbish bins, in contaminated waste, and ambulance transfers. As this occurs it disadvantages the linen service and disadvantages customers by not being able to meet the requirements of the orders. The service is currently working with our customers to try to resolve these issues.

As part of Sydney and Central Coast Linen Service's commitment to providing a quality service, the Organisation recently conducted a Satisfaction Survey to the Ramsay facilities they provide linen to. The survey focused on satisfaction with quality of the linen, customer service provided, stock levels and general comments to improve our current service. Results of the survey are currently being collated and a proposed action plan will be provided to each of the facilities that participated in the survey. Thanks or your participation.

I was extremely lucky to walk the Kokoda Trail on my leave in July. The Kokoda Trail is a most amazing, tough, spiritual and emotional journey. We owe our boys and the PNG Fuzzy Wuzzy's a huge debt of gratitude for their effort. Their "Courage, Mateship, Sacrifice and Endurance" are symbolised at a memorial at Isurava on the Track.

The Japanese almost made it to Port Moresby and could see the lights of the town. Our boys defeated the Japanese, with the support and dedication of the PNG Fuzzy Wuzzy's, for the first time during World War 2. The Japanese had up until then they'd stormed through the Pacific.

Remember - the boys that held the Japanese back initially ere militia not regular army and they held back the Japanese for many weeks until the regular army arrived. These were hardened Japanese soldiers who had fought all through the Pacific without defeat.

I met 3 old original Fuzzy Wuzzy's on the Track who supported the Aussies during that time- they are extremely proud of their efforts and glow with that pride. Having had the support of a PNG porter through the trek, you can't imagine what joyful, helpful, warm people they are. Always with a smile and a helping hand, I certainly couldn't have done this amazing trek without the support of my tremendous Porter, Simon. An I wasn't being shot at by an enemy, starved or watching my mates fall in battle

PNG is a very poor country with 70% unemployment and subsistence living. PNG has been independent since 1975 and many locals that I spoke with wish Australia was still governing their country

I've been to Gallipoli and Kokoda in my mind is World War 2's Gallipoli but even more significant due to the extremes of environment and the fact that the enemy was on Australia's door step for the first time in history- remember - Darwin was being bombed, subs in Sydney Harbour. Scary times.

In an effort to support the PNG people who have never been officially thanked or paid by the Australian Government for their tireless efforts in support or our soldiers, I am working on organising first aid training for the locals as a long term initiative with the St John's Ambulance in PNG, and the company I trekked with Executive Excellence. In addition, I my goal is to establish a system to provide support to the Kokoda Hospital, a tiny local hospital isolated at the beginning of the track. I hope to provide a long term support to these wonderful people who live in isolation amongst an extreme but beautiful environment. A truly amazing experience and I would encourage anyone thinking about going to do just that".

Suzy McLean, Warringal's Cardiac Case Manager, submitted a poster on "Utilisation of



"We are harnessing the Ramsay Health Care brand and the fact that we have a lot of choice in hospitals to offer graduates," Karina said.



First patient in world to trial new Hep B therapy

Greenslopes Private Hospital has enrolled the very first patient in the world in a major new international study examining the appropriate dose and treatment duration of a new therapy for hepatitis B.

The local study group is led by leading Queensland Gastroenterologist, Professor Darrell Crawford who believes that this trial will clarify many issues about the treatment of hepatitis B.

Chronic hepatitis B is a major global health problem. It is estimated that more than 400 million people world wide are chronically infected with hepatitis B virus - approximately 100,000 to 150,000 Australians are infected with the virus.

Hepatitis B is estimated to be responsible for 250,000 deaths per year and it is thought to be the leading global cause of chronic hepatitis, cirrhosis and primary liver cancer.

Professor Crawford said current available therapies for hepatitis B are limited because resistance to the anti-viral agent is common.

"Life long therapy is often needed to prevent patients developing complications of end stage liver disease," Professor Crawford said.

"With this new therapy, viral resistance is not an issue and the agent needs to be administered for a limited period of time only."

Professor Crawford said clarifying the dose and the exact duration of therapy needed to achieve viral clearance would be an important step in improving therapeutic options for patients with hepatitis B.
